Hello,

we are looking for relevant legislation that regulates procedure of issuing certification of signature by notaries public in California.

More precisely, we would like to know whether it is a common practice in the USA to bind (in a way that it is not possible to separate pages) and seal documents in cases of notarizing signatures. Our documents were not accepted as valid in Croatia because they were not affixed inseparably by the US notary.
